



The story (and the enduring presence) of Sir Ernest Shackleton

In 1917, Sir Ernest Shackleton and a small, desperate crew embarked on what is widely recognized as the greatest survival and rescue story in Antarctic (or any!) history. Shackleton's quest to cross Antarctica aboard the expedition ship Endurance ended when the ship and its crew were frozen in place by encroaching pack ice. Eight months later, the ship was crushed and its crew forced to make a go of it on sea ice that was literally shifting under their feet. For another four months, they survived on little more than penguin and seal meat, before Shackleton and five crew members set sail in a tiny lifeboat across 720 nautical miles from Elephant Island to South Georgia, through hurricane winds and 50-foot waves – with nothing to guide them but the sun, the horizon, a few rudimentary tools, and whatever luck the gods might grant them. Miraculously, they not only made it, but Shackleton did not give up having made four attempts at rescuing the remaining shipmates who had survived an additional four months on Elephant Island. By the time the entire Endurance crew were reunited, not a single man died over the course of the two year harrowing experience.

To explore Antarctica is to feel Shackleton's presence, even to this day.





34 DAYS / 33 NIGHTS ON BOARD

USHUAIA TO CAPE VERDE

Join us on a unique expedition from the world's southernmost city to the Cape Verde islands, perfect for those who love the sea and long voyages, exploring more remote locations, and escaping from the world for a few weeks. This voyage of many thousands of miles will include some of the most remote and fascinating islands in the southern Atlantic. Our encounters will be extraordinary whether your interest lies in birds, marine or other wildlife, or the botany and cultural life of the islands.

Please note that flexibility is key to a successful expedition. This voyage will include several days at sea on ocean passages. Landings will be weather dependent and more than one day has been factored in for each remote island group to optimise chances of getting ashore. The exact route and landings will depend on weather and sea conditions and wildlife encountered.

- A rare opportunity to encounter birds endemic to both the Falklands/South Georgia and the South Atlantic.
- Landings in the Falklands, South Georgia Island, Tristan da Cunha, St. Helena, Ascension, and Cabo Verde.

DEPARTURE

• Mar 14 – Apr 16, 2024

Day 1, Arrive in Ushuaia:

Transfer to the Arakur Resort and Spa, surrounded by stunning panoramic views, native forests, natural terraces, and green areas. Enjoy the resorts facilities and then attend an evening briefing where you'll have the opportunity to ask questions and meet some of your fellow travelers.



Day 2, Embarkation:

Spend your morning exploring Ushuaia or unwinding at the resort until our mid-afternoon transfer to the ship. Our Expedition Team and ship staff will greet you on board, followed by a safety and orientation briefing and Captain's welcome dinner.

Day 3, Scotia Sea:

Wildlife spotting opportunities as we sail across the Scotia Sea will include albatross, prions, and petrels that frequently follow the ship. Our expedition team will be out on deck looking for whales and dolphins that may also be seen in the area. During our crossing to the Falkland Islands, our onboard experts will begin their presentations with informative and entertaining talks on the wildlife, history, and geology of the Southern Ocean.



Day 4-5, The Falkland Islands (Malvinas):

The Falkland Islands (Malvinas) are isolated, windswept, and a haven for wildlife, and will be our base for a few days of exploration. Our visit in March should coincide with the end of the breeding season for the many seabirds that make

these islands their summer home including Gentoo, Magellanic and Rockhopper penguins, as well as the Black-Browed albatross. Hopping in our inflatable Zodiacs, we hope to see a flurry of activity associated with fledging seabirds and adults departing the islands before autumn closes in. We also plan to call at Port Stanley, the charming capital of the Falklands (Malvinas) and discover some of the historic sites from museums to battlefields.

Day 6-7, At Sea:

As we cruise towards South Georgia, the richness of these waters will be evident in the marine mammal life – especially Fur seals on fishing forays. We have a good chance of spotting Humpback and Fin whales while the birds circling our stern will be outstanding, particularly the large albatross and numerous breeds of petrels.

Day 8-10, South Georgia:

Three glorious days of expedition cruising in and around South Georgia, a paradise island with snowclad mountain peaks rising 9000 feet and hundreds of glaciers tumbling down towards the sea. Large colonies of King penguins make South Georgia one of our planet's greatest wonders. During our visit (in the Austral Autumn) the fluffy brown King chicks hatched in the summer, will crowd the shores like a huge kindergarten.

We hope to catch the Wandering albatross and migrating whales as the wildlife starts to prepare for the upcoming winter.

Witness incredible scenes of this unique animal paradise on walks, hikes, and Zodiac rides while our onboard team of biologists and geologists increase your knowledge of this unique natural experience. Meanwhile, in Grytviken, we will visit the old whaling station and pay our respects at the grave of 'the boss' — Ernest Shackleton.



Day 11-15, At Sea:

Our lecture program continues as will opportunities to watch wildlife from the deck as we sail towards the most remote inhabited archipelago of islands in the world — Tristan Da Cunha.

Day 16-17, Tristán da Cunha:

First sighted in the early 16th century and settled in the early 1800s, Tristan da Cunha was frequented by naval



ships, whalers, and sealers throughout the 19th century. Today it is home to some 250 hardy souls who make their living from the sea.

With two days here, there will be plenty of time to visit the main settlement of Edinburgh of the Seven Seas where local guides will tell us about the island's history and culture. Take an optional hike to a volcano where we learn about its eruption in 1961 and the impact that had on the local population. End at the Thatched House Museum featuring a home preserved from that time. Other walks will include the cliffs and the potato patches where we can hear about the islanders' subsistence farming. We also hope to visit Nightingale Island, one of the most unique wildlife strongholds in the world and home to thousands of seabirds.

Day 18-21, At Sea:

Our Lecture series and wildlife/bird viewing continues in preparation for our upcoming visit to St. Helena.

Day 22-24, Jamestown, St. Helena:

Discovered by the Portuguese in 1502, the island of St Helena has been both a Dutch and British possession. In the late 17th century, the island became a strategically important port of call in the British Empire and was controlled by the East India Company for over 200 years.

The island is probably best known as Napoleon's last place of exile, where he died in 1821 after six years living at Longwood House, which we will visit.

Explore the tiny capital of Jamestown and see the courthouse, government buildings and library. Those feeling active may want to climb the 699 steps of Jacob's Ladder with views over Jamestown. During a range of walks for all levels, there will be time to explore the surrounding countryside, experience some amazing views, and witness the prolific birdlife, including the endemic St. Helena Wirebird. Coffee lovers may want to try the rare 'Green Tipped Bourbon Arabica', grown on the island since 1732. Those interested in spirits might enjoy a visit to the most remote distillery in the world with the opportunity to taste the local gin, rum, and 'Tungi' made from local prickly pears.

Day 25-26, At Sea:

We'll celebrate crossing the Equator with a special ceremony and swim in Seaventure's saltwater pool, which will be filled especially for this occasion. Our Lecture series continues in preparation for landing in Ascension.

Day 27-28, Georgetown, Ascension Island:

Named after the day it was discovered, and first inhabited in 1815 by a British Garrison, today Ascension Island plays an important role in supplying British forces and scientists based in the South Atlantic.

The massive marine reserve, designed to protect the unique ecosystem, is home to huge Marlin, green turtles, and the endemic Frigate bird. We hope to take the opportunity to climb Green Mountain, explore the small capital of Georgetown, and if time and conditions allow, circumnavigate the island.

Day 29-32, At Sea:

Our lecture series continues as we approach Cape Verde, for our final shore excursion before departure.

Day 33, Praia, Cape Verde:

This morning we'll be in port in Praia, the capital city of the Cape Verde Islands. We will have a full day to explore Praia's colonial architecture, bustling markets, and beautiful beaches, before returning to the Seaventure for a sumptuous final night feast.

Day 34, Disembarkation, Sal, Cape Verde:

Disembark this morning and transfer to Amílcar Cabral International Airport, in Sal, Cape Verde. (Airport Code SID). Flight options (at your own expense) include TAP Airlines direct to Lisbon or Edelweiss Airlines direct to Zurich Switzerland, where you can connect to your home airport or make your own way from the ship to a local hotel and enjoy everything this island has to offer.





When To Visit Antarctica

Is there a bad time to visit Antarctica? Yes. In the heart of the Antarctic Winter, (June & July) temperatures are well below 0° Fahrenheit and many days have little or no sunlight. Expeditionary voyages begin in November and run through March, and each of those months have unique features in terms of both weather and wildlife activity. Love Whales? Want to see penguin chicks fledge? Below is a month-by-month description to help you find the voyage that best matches your interests.

NOVEMBER

- The penguins populations in the rookeries are swelling and the birds are busy nest-building and courting
- Extensive snow cloaks Antarctica in a 'pristine whiteness'. Sea ice is still prevalent and at its most impressive
- Fantastic photo opportunities amazing sunsets, noctilucent clouds and spring flowers blooming in The Falklands
- Weddell and Fur seals are busy mating, while in South Georgia rowdy beach master Elephant seals are fighting
- Albatross, marine fulmars and petrels fly the Drake Passage while Blue-eyed shags return to Antarctica





DECEMBER

- The start of summer up to 22 hours of daylight and sunnier days means more time for exploring
- The density of wildlife is increasing penguin rookeries are at full capacity, while seal and whale sightings become common
- Penguin chicks begin to hatch, first in the Falklands, and then from mid-December on the Peninsula
- December marks the arrival back in Antarctic waters of hungry humpback whales from tropical waters
- Access to the landing sites becomes easier in December and breakup of ice allows wider exploration

JANUARY

- It is the height of summer on the Peninsula with temperatures rising to 60 F / 15 C and the weather is generally stable
- Penguin chicks are at their fluffiest and making strong demands on their busy parents for food
- The opening up of the ice allows the season's first Polar Circle voyages to reach 66 degrees south
- Humpback whales are very focused on gorging on krill after their long commute from the tropics
- The ice in the Ross Sea opens up allowing a short window to access the historic huts of Shackleton & Scott



MARCH

- You are guaranteed great whale encounters -February and March are the best months for whale watching
- The penguin chicks are very curious towards visitors and are often drawn to the colour yellow in particular
- It's a popular month for photographers, with the sun now lower in the sky and wonderful sunsets/rises
- March can be a magical time as there are fewer ships around and it feels like you have Antarctica to yourself
- On South Georgia, the King penguin rookeries are at their most impressive and Macaroni's are in their greatest numbers



FEBRUARY

- The penguin chicks are now very active and curious, chasing both parents for food as soon as they return from fishing trips
- It's peak whale spotting season as all migrating pods have now made it down to Antarctica's rich waters
- February is the perfect month to reach the Polar Circle, now that the ice has receded to its maximum extent
- The moulting stage begins for the adult penguins, while the chicks are fledging and learning to swim in the shallows
- The focus of the Humpback whales now changes, becoming more inquisitive now they've sated their appetite

Polar Latitudes Citizen Science Program

Citizen Science is a way to harness the power of travelers to observe, record, and report on natural phenomena. This is particularly helpful in the Antarctic, where it is challenging to support long-term academic observation teams.

Guests on Polar Latitudes voyages are invited to participate in data-gathering activities that support major research projects. The data we collect contributes to a better understanding of Antarctica's unique ecology and changing climate.

The projects offered may vary slightly by voyage. If you are interested in participating please see the onboard daily bulletin and join the scheduled Citizen Science Introduction Meeting at the start of your voyage. There is no additional cost to participate.

Projects

SEABIRD SURVEYS

Providing data for Stony Brook University

We complete at-sea and on-shore bird surveys for Stoney Brook University to study the distribution, population status, and breeding events of birds in the Southern Ocean and along the Antarctic Peninsula.

CLOUD OBSERVATIONS

Providing data for NASA Globe Observer

By observing and recording cloud cover & type timed to NASA satellite fly-overs, we can help scientists understand how surface and air temperature are affected by cloud cover, and how clouds will respond to a changing climate as well.



Collecting phytoplankton samples for the Scripps Institution of Oceanography





SALP PROJECT

Providing data for Alfred Wegener Institute

Salp are free-swimming invertebrates that feed on phytoplankton. We will collect baseline data of Salp distribution around our landing sites and also collect a few specimens for genetic species determination. There has been a recent increase in Salp abundance on a circumpolar scale around Antarctica. The data we collect will help scientists of the Alfred Wegener Institute explore how this might be linked to a changing climate.

SOUTHERN OCEAN WATER SAMPLING

Providing data for the Scripps Institution of Oceanography

We will be measuring the surface water temperature and salinity during sea days on crossings between Ushuaia and the Peninsula, as well as between South Georgia and the Peninsula for the Scripps Institution of Oceanography. The data we collect contributes to a study of the long-term temperature and salinity trends of the Southern Ocean.

FJORDPHYTO – PHYTOPLANKTON

Providing data for the Scripps Institution of Oceanography

By collecting phytoplankton samples in fjord systems along the Antarctic Peninsula, we help scientists at the Scripps Institution of Oceanography obtain a seasonal picture of phytoplankton abundance, composition, and distribution throughout the growth season (from October to March), as well as how phytoplankton are influenced by (increasing) melt-water inflow from glaciers.

MARINE MAMMAL IDENTIFICATION

Providing data for Happy Whale and the International Whaling Commission

We photograph unique identifiable markings on a whale's fluke (tail) and dorsal fin, which allows Happy Whale to non-invasively track whale movements over time. By focusing on whales, we bring attention to the marine ecosystem as a whole and the challenges we face as a global community.

This program is designed for those guests who just want a taste of the Antarctic kayaking experience. Each participant kayaks once per voyage in a group of 14 with a dedicated guide team and safety Zodiac. Total number of available kayaking spots on each departure will vary by itinerary length and weather, but we aim to get groups on the water at every opportunity.

Advanced booking is recommended.

* Because the number of kayaking opportunities will vary by voyage, we are setting the pre-booking availability for Discover Kayaking very conservatively, with 28 spots for Adventures in Antarctica and FSG voyages, 42 spots on Celebrating Antarctica voyages, and 56 spots on Circle Crossing voyages. In the event that additional spots are available on board, we will offer them to any interested pax, on a first-come, first-served basis.

THE DETAILS:

Anyone 16 or older, in reasonably good health and with even a small amount of paddling experience is welcome to join.

Prior to your first kayaking adventure, our guides will do a thorough job of handing out and explaining all your gear, as well as the basic rules of operating an ocean kayak.

Typical excursions last anywhere from 1-3 hours.

WE PROVIDE:

High Density Polyethylene (HDPE) tandem (two-man) kayaks with paddles, dry suits, personal floatation devices (PFDs), and pogies (neoprene gloves.)

A sense of adventure is all you need.



It hugs the body, is both warm and breathable, and features an extra-high collar and extra-long bottom in the back, to keep the chill and sea mist from ever sneaking up or down your spine. We added plenty of sturdy loops to secure gloves, a waterbottle, or a set of keys, ensuring that nothing goes overboard. 


Exploring Antarctica aboard the MS Seaventure






